College of Speech Therapists' refresher courses¹

The College of Speech Therapists (CST) ran a series of refresher courses for its members from 1952 to 1976. Members at the 1951 AGM thought that having more conferences and refresher courses would be more beneficial than the establishment of a College library. The subsequent courses were organised and run by the CST geographical Area groups on a rotational basis.

In subsequent discussion of the two possibilities, viz., the institution of a library and more conferences and refresher courses, it had been apparent that the latter would prove more popular. A properly run library would

Earlier refresher courses

These were however not the first refresher courses for speech therapists. Miss Eileen MacLeod (who had founded the British Society of Speech Therapists and became the first Chairman of CST) ran a seminar course for speech therapists in what was described as 'the first of its kind to be held in this country' from 6 to 11 July 1936 (*Speech* 1/4, p. 39). It included lectures on several client-groups and discussions as well as visits to observe speech therapy in hospitals, clinics and a school. It was aimed at practising speech therapists in the UK as a refresher course but also at giving 'American and foreign visitors an opportunity of studying British methods of speech therapy.' In *Speech* 2/2 (p. 18) we're given a report from the course, which was apparently attended only by British speech therapists. The course was to be repeated in 1938 (*Speech* 3/4, p. 31), with the cost reduced for BSST members and associates. Miss Kingdon Ward arranged a series of lecture courses from April to July 1940. 'It is thought that this opportunity will be welcomed by many who are missing such amenities' (*Speech* 5/2, p. 5). It's not known if they were able to run.

CST refresher courses 1952-76

The series starting in 1952 had been preceded by other refresher courses run under CST auspices, eg in 1947 in Glasgow and London (the latter five-day event is reported in some detail in *Bulletin* 11, pp. 3-4) and in Scotland in 1950.

During May and June the Glasgow College is running a Refresher Course, comprising the following series: "Sound" by Drs. Bell and Weir (Glasgow Univ.); "Cleft Palate Surgery" by Dr. Mathew White (Yorkhill Hospital); "Dyslalia" by Miss Maud Kenny, M.A., L.C.S.T. (Chief Therapist, Dunbartonshire); "Psychiatric Social Work" by Mrs McConville (Chief Social Worker, Notre Dame Clinic, Glasgow). from Bulletin No. 10, p. 3.

This year's Scottish Refresher Course for therapists was combined with a course of special study for the students of the Glasgow and Edinburgh Schools. It was conducted by Mrs. Pauline Marland and extended over one full week. The subjects were "The Study and Treatment of cases of Spastic Paralysis as viewed by the Speech Therapist" and "Pharyngcal Voice". Large numbers attended and were highly appreciative of Mrs. Marland's excellent course on both subjects.

Table 1 shows what is likely to be an incomplete list of the geographical areas and topics covered by the CST refresher courses, notices for them and reports made afterwards. It was compiled from information in *Bulletin*. Many but not all of the courses were themed. The shortest course was a day long, with many others lasted 3-4 days (with a tendency for them to get longer through the decades). They were held in various locations in Scotland and England.

The series lasted for 24 years, but for a number of reasons was cancelled by Council in the mid-1970s. Having already had some discussion on the topic (eg meeting of 8 November 1974), CST Council decided at its meeting of 12 March 1976 that there would be no more refresher courses(see below).

Future College Refresher Courses

Three Council members had met to discuss this matter, and in view of

- (a) the number of in-service and postgraduate courses available since reorganisation
- refresher courses arranged for those returning to the profession, and
- (c) the current difficulty of obtaining funding from A.H.As, they recommended that:
- the National Conference be held every three years, located in a different Area on each occasion.
- (ii) there shall be no College refresher courses in the intervening years.
- (iii) the proposed Refresher Courses for 1977 in Birmingham and 1978 in Ireland be incorporated into the 1979 Conference.
- (iv) the College A.G.M. continues to take place in different parts of the country.
- (v) each Area should hold a Study Day with high calibre speakers and, in alternate years, the Jansson Lecture Fund should pay for the speaker.

Council unanimously agreed (i)-(iv). With regard to (v) it was considered that, in view of the lack of A.H.A. funds, it was unlikely that Area Study Days would be supported.

Dissemination

Some of the papers from the refresher courses appeared in the professional journal or in *Bulletin*, so that those SLTs unable to attend the courses could share the knowledge and experience imparted (sample shown in Appendix 5). An analysis of the papers in the journal (*Speech* - later *Speech Pathology and Therapy*) from 1946-1965² showed that written versions of lectures given (including some from refresher courses) represented 22% of the total number published in the journal during that time.

It should be possible, at a later stage, for every member of the College to have the opportunity of garing the lectures as they were given. We owe this to Mr Good's initiative and tireless work during three days, recording -(on one of the most up-to-date machines) - each speaker in turn. It is hoped to form a library of the tapes for loan, or hire? to the different Areas, if and as they wish to make use of them from time to time.

Several reel-to-reel recordings remain in the RCSLT old tape collection, eg Scottish Area 1964 course - Dr A McAllister: 'Stammering - a disorder of communication' Southern Area 1968 course - Mrs Clarke: 'Iron hand and velvet glove'.

Of the time...
